Christian Education Committee Annual Report for Oct. 2017-Sept. 2018

Although this committee doesn't meet regularly, we still do some important teaching in our church.

Our **Sunday School** meets weekly September through June at 9 a.m. with Darlene Schmeltzle and helper Patti Mittl working with the children ages 2 through Kindergarten. Susan Jacobs with helper Alyson Miller work with the children from first grade and older. As these children grow, we will provide educational opportunities for them.

We are grateful for these dedicated individuals who have been in the Sunday School for a long time. We also thank Pat Sajkowicz who faithfully meets with the children. Pat plays piano so they can express their faith through music. The children **sang in worship** on White Gift Sunday in December of 2017, Easter Sunday of 2018, and the last Sunday of Sunday School. Our congregation loves to see and hear these great voices share their praise of the Lord.

We continue to offer our **Third Sunday Treats** with the help of Wanda Yeakel, Jack and Wendy Yeakel. We are grateful for their faithfulness to this ministry. The children look forward to this opportunity to have breakfast treats as do the others who stop down in the lower social hall on the third Sunday.

Other educational opportunities that we shared this past year include:

- Oct. 15 We celebrated **local first responders** in worship with the help of author and local firefighter **George DeVault**. I used excerpts from his book in my sermon and he shared in a seminar after worship that included lunch. He spoke about passages in his book and our "old timers" enjoyed sharing and reminiscing with him. He also spoke about fire safety and practical tips that we could all appreciate. At the end of the seminar he sold some of his books to us, **FIRE CALL! Sounding the Alarm to Save our Vanishing Volunteers**, and also took a group of us outside so we could learn how to discharge a fire extinguisher. I believe the seminar was enjoyed by all as we found it informational as well as meaningful. On this same date, we ran a **blood drive** so we could truly celebrate all of the heroes in our midst.
- Oct. 29 we started a **Willing Visitors group**. These folks agreed to visit our homebound members to share a cheerful visit with them so they continue to feel connected to the church. I spent some time training the group in listening skills and sharing tips on successful homebound visits. We agreed to meet again to share notes about our visits and learn more. Our next meeting included some information about dementia, a growing concern among the older members of our congregation. The visitors were able to visit many of our homebound members and were also able to help distribute Christmas gift bags and a spring Blue Bird to our homebound members. These items were created by our Village School families as directed by the Salvaterra family. We especially thank them for their kind gifts to our oldest members.

- Nov. 26 we were grateful to have a presentation by the **PNEC Amigos de Guatemala partnership**. The Rev. Sharon Harfman brought a power point presentation to update us on the progress of the clinic and to help us to keep this ministry in prayer as it progresses. She also brought some items to sell that were hand made by our Guatemala brothers and sisters. We enjoyed purchasing items knowing that the money goes directly to the creators of the items.
- Spring of 2018 we held **another blood drive** and gave each of the SS children a cardboard bank and an activity/fund raising calendar for use with the **One Great Hour of Sharing** campaign that was happening in the congregation. The families of the Sunday School seemed to enjoy collecting money for OGHS and we were grateful for their participation.
- September 2018 we started a brand new year of Sunday School with several new faces. We are very grateful to be able to teach and share the word of the Lord with those who join us each week.

Computer and Media Committee Annual Report for June 2018 to September 2018

Committee Members: Lori Esslinger (Pastor), Mark Weaver (Chair), Beth Massa, Joan Muth, Kelly Kowalewski, Robin Yoder (Consulting Member), Brenda Seitz (Consulting Member), Future Open Slots (2)

Committee Purpose: The faith-based purpose of the Computer and Media Committee is to foster communication both inside and outside of Old Zionsville UCC (OZUCC). The committee promotes community, ideas, and activities by helping people experience and share the loving presence of God and to understand what OZUCC stands for and who we are. All Information Technology, including software and hardware, of OZUCC is maintained at an affordable price.

Pre-Committee Background:

- May 2017 The existing OZUCC Computer Use Policy is in need of an update
- June 2017 The OZUCC Office is in need of a knowledgeable person(s) to provide assistance with the computers and related infrastructure / Mark Weaver volunteers to become the IT Administrator
- July 2017 Mark Weaver performed an audit of the IT Systems of the Church to gain insight into the equipment and future needs
- August 2017 through April 2018 Mark Weaver provided assistance to various issues surrounding the IT Systems and it soon became obvious that a larger group presence was needed
- May 2018 Pastor Lori began soliciting for members to join the committee
- June 2018 The first organizational meeting of the committee was held and our work began

June 2018:

- A fact finding Workshop Meeting was held on June 4, 2018
- An initial schedule for bi-weekly meetings was proposed, with the first meeting scheduled in early July
- Lively discussion was had and notes taken on topics including: The existing Main and Events Web Sites, Telephone and Internet Service Provider, Future Web Hosting, and Web Site Improvements

July 2018:

- The first "Official" Meeting was held on July 2nd with additional meetings held on July 18th and 30th
- Administrative tasks were undertaken to develop committee Size, Membership, and Quorum requirements, as well as collecting member contact information
- A permanent schedule was adopted for meetings to be held on the third Monday of each month beginning in September
- The definition of "Computer and Media Committee" was discussed, whereby Beth Massa volunteered to prepare a draft of a Faith-based Purpose and the committee scope was reviewed and agreed upon
- A draft of the updated OZUCC Computer Use Policy was given to committee members for review
- Renewal of the PTD Web Domain Registration (oldzionsucc.org) was discussed and payment approved
- Significant discussion and research was done by the committee regarding future
 Web Hosting and Web Site improvements, including developing a prioritized list of
 Musts and Wants
- Research began on looking for a new Web Hosting Provider which could support our list of Musts and Wants, but would also be cost effective
- The committee decided to review and edit the current Web Site to bring it up to date, as an interim fix, before making any move to a new Web Host / Site

August 2018:

- Committee Meetings were held on August 15th and 27th
- Beth Massa provided a draft of a Faith-based Purpose which was approved by the committee
- A review of the existing Web Site was completed and the edits were done by Beth Massa
- The committee proposed items for a 2019 budget as requested by Finance, whereby Mark Weaver crafted the official budget request and submitted to Todd Griesemer by the due date
- Sound and Audio (Operation), which had previously been a low priority, was elevated due to the departure of Amber Kriebel. Alyson Miller agreed to become the primary Sound System resource, but the committee discussed plans for soliciting additional help as well as providing for training and updating the out-ofdate operating manual

September 2018:

- A Committee Meeting was held on September 17th
- After further review, the committee recommended that the OZUCC Computer Use Policy version dated May 16, 2018 stand as is and be referred to Consistory for approval

- A Domain Name problem which was discovered by Beth Massa, did not have a simple fix by either PTD or Google, and led the committee to escalate searching for a new Web Host
- Beth Massa provided further research and suggested we look into "Inmotion Hosting" which is fully compatible with UCC Corporate templates and reasonably priced. The committee subsequently agreed to let Beth take on a 30 day trial, which she will report back on in October.
- The committee reviewed and approved the 2019 budget request which Mark Weaver had previously sent to the Finance Committee
- The committee further discussed the Sound and Audio Training and continued looking for information to support the updates to the Operating Manual
- Working with Pastor Lori, the committee helped to refine an "Input Form" for advertising OZUCC Events on the new Upper Milford Township Electronic Billboard

Looking Forward - There is still more work to be done:

- Decision on moving forward with Inmotion Hosting / Implementing our Musts and Wants List
- Incorporating Social & Aid Events into the new Web Site / Disposition of the existing Web Sites
- Follow through on the Sound and Audio Training / Operating Manual Update
- Implementation of our 2019 Budget Line Items, if approved
- Phone and Internet Service Provider Speed and Bandwidth requirements -Picking the right plan
- Web Editing and Publishing Policy / Need for and who will be the Web Master
- Membership and Giving Management Should this be combined with our Web Hosting Service
- Committee review of the 2017 Computer and IT Audit / Report by Mark Weaver
- Church Sign Board (out front) Revamp

Our twelfth year as F.U.N. Group began October 2017.

In October, 90 hygiene kits were assembled for disaster relief.

The third-year collection for Samaritan's Purse: Operation Christmas Child yielded 51 boxes. Which was double last year's yield!

Jane Bedell's name was drawn on Palm Sunday for the 2 Adventure Aquarium tickets. The Church Bazaar and Basket Auction on November 11th was once again quite successful. The number of baskets to auction increased to 115 this year! The bake sale was one of our largest. Our total profits were \$2044, so we were able to distribute \$2000 to the following (42% church oriented):

A great big THANK YOU to all those who donated their time, baskets, baked goods and came to enjoy the day.

Thank you to all who donated socks, gloves, hats and blankets for the Angel Tree in November for women and children at Turning Point.

Share the Warmth items (coats, hats, gloves) were collected through December. Many items were taken to Zionsville Area Food Pantry for distribution to those in need. Also, in December, Dan Schantz coupons yielded \$124 for the Village School.

In January we hosted the "Souper Bowl" covered dish social, which was attended by 42 people. We enjoyed 11 soups, as well as breads and desserts. A generous shopping cart full of soups was collected for the Zionsville Area Food Pantry. Thank you to Social and Aid Committee for their donation.

Our annual toiletry collection in March yielded a shopping cart full of toiletries for the Zionsville Area Food Pantry.

In April, Family Game Night was hosted. Although only 24 attended, everyone had great FUN! We enjoyed snacks, playing various games and Millie Kohler donated prizes.

June's shopping cart full of peanut butter and jelly was donated to our Zionsville Area Food Pantry. Dan Schantz fundraiser collected \$180. Textile Recycling Fundraiser at the yard sale gave us \$166.50. (Clothing, shoes, handbags, stuffed toys, curtains, bedding, etc. was collected.)

Lunch Bunch met several times throughout the year and culminated with a picnic at the Weaver's house in June.

The July collection of shoeboxes for Samaritan's Purse: Operation Christmas Child was not as successful as last year, so we encouraged folks to make a box and bring it to church by October.

And lastly, we collected back to school supplies in August. These items were distributed to Lincoln Elementary, Eyer Middle, Lower Macungie Middle, and Emmaus High Schools.

F.U.N. Group had a very successful year, thanks to the generosity of our congregation. All church members are encouraged to attend our meetings. We need more input and would become more productive if we had more people in attendance, even if you can't commit to coming every month. So, join us on the second Tuesday of the month. Finance Committee Annual Report October 2017 to September 2018

The Finance Committee worked hard on preparing the budget in a new format for the 2017 Annual Meeting. It was much easier to understand and categories were simplified for all members to see where the funds came from and where they went.

We also oversee the parsonage rental. With our new tenant, we created a Tenant Church Liaison position so that the tenant would have a direct line of contact with just one person from the Church. We thank Bob Souder for filling that role for this new position. The rent has been paid in a timely manner and the requests for upkeep and/or repairs have been addressed via property committee.

Through Bob's leadership, a Memorandum of Understanding between the church and the Village School was created. We found documents from 1970s when the original proposals were made to start the school, but we were unable to find any follow up records about how the church and school should function in the future. After several revisions and discussions with the Village School leadership and Consistory, a signed Memorandum of Understanding was reached and now leads the way in guiding the working relationship between the church and the school. Thanks to all who put many hours into that process.

It was discovered in March that our web hosting agreement was coming due and we decided to take the time to update that portion of our church presence on the internet. The Computer and Media committee was born under the very capable leadership of Mark Weaver. We are grateful for that committee to take a serious look at the economics of our web agreements as well as the overall value of our web presence.

Along with all of the above, we continue monitoring spending and financial issues. We continue to evaluate our assets and prepare proper investments to be the best stewards of our finances. These last few years have been unique in that we have been running the church in black ink. We were blessed this year to receive a bequest from James Laudenslager too. That money is being invested until a specific plan is set in place for it.

Sadly, Robert Souder decided to step down from all of his church responsibilities in the spring of 2018. That caused our committee to regroup with a new chair in place. We thank Carl Lorish for stepping in. Last year Ed Reis decided to step down, so we had room to add another member to the committee. We thank Millie Kohler for taking a seat with us.

Decisions were also made this year to update the way we have been reporting the parking lot financing. The decisions will be reflected next year, 2019.

It has been an eventful year with lots of forward motion thanks to our wonderful and very thoughtful committee.

The Historical Task Force met several times this year with the purpose of caring for the historical records and properly framing the 1789 Indenture which basically deeds the

land on which the church and cemetery are now situated to the church. The indenture, printed in Old English, was transcribed and typed by Beth Massa. The framing was done

by Laura's Frame shop in Emmaus. The committee decided where to hang the indenture (thanks to Rich Shoemaker for hanging it properly) so it would be enjoyed as an important historical document and then decided on a service of worship in which to present it and celebrate it with the congregation. (money for all of this was donated to us in the form of a grant from a local club) We held a Vintage Sunday in March where we invited the congregation to dress in colonial era garb or patriotic colors. We enacted a skit that was written by the group and performed by the members of the task force plus Mark Weaver. We served snacks after worship which included pretzels (monks of the time period created pretzels to remind people to pray - little praying arms) and iced tea (reminding of the Boston Tea party of that same era). Many people dressed the parts and I think the whole event was enjoyed by all.

My thanks to the whole Historical Task Force for a job well done.

We continue to look for someone to love and take care of the historical room. There are mountains of precious information about the church's history stored there and could easily be put on display on a rotating basis.

They symbolizes our giving up of these weights on our shoulders and offering them to God for good. We know that God already forgives us. We need to forgive ourselves.
 - We also participate in the Ministerium Thanksgiving Eve Service.
- In December, we celebrate Advent by decorating the sanctuary (thanks to Mel and Barbie Kerchner who have been doing that for years! and to the Bill Yeakel family for donating a Christmas tree). We especially enjoy White Gift Sunday which is usually the second Sunday of Advent. Our Sunday School children sing in worship that day, we bring forward to the Christmas tree gifts for the youth at Bethany Children's home that are wrapped in white paper, and we celebrate after worship with a Birthday Cake for Jesus.
- Christmas Eve this past year was celebrated with a Wiggly Giggly service of worship at 5 p.m. led by local guitarist Joel Shimer. Families had fun wiggling and giggling as we told the Christmas story and sang some familiar songs to celebrate. The children were each given jingle bells to make some noise for the Babe of Bethlehem. Battery operated candles were used in the Silent Night song for all. A special musical gift this past year was shared by a trio of gals who had been singing together for a long time until their accompanist, Patrice DiCarne died a few years ago. Now, with courage, the gals gathered together again for the first time back in public to offer a beautiful rendition of Mary Did You Know to our Wiggly Giggly crowd. A pianist from Zion's Lehigh Lutheran Church was able to accompany this beautiful gift to us all.
- Christmas Eve at 7:30 p.m. began with a bell choir prelude at 7 p.m. Our worship at 11 p.m. was light in attendance due to a snow storm that had begun but we braved it and brought in the birth of the Babe of Bethlehem at Midnight.
- We thank Bobby Schmeltzle and Rich Shoemaker for putting luminaria around the building in memory of Henry Beitler on Christmas Eve. We also thank the Vera Cruz Fire Police for keeping our pedestrians and vehicles safe at the intersection in front of the church.
- In January we participated in the Ministerium Pulpit exchange to celebrate Ecumenical Sunday.
- In February we always enjoy celebrating Boy Scout Sunday. Our Cub Pack is growing in leaps and bounds. Many of the boys in the Troop have gone forward to work for their Eagle Rank which is a huge accomplishment.

All Literacy Through the Arts programs are at a cost of \$5 per Student.
