COMMITTEE AND GROUP REPORTS

Boy Scout Troop 31: Highlights from Oct. 2019 through Sept. 2020

Membership: 16 youth and 11 adult leaders

Year in Review:

Troop 31 experienced a major growth spurt over the past 12 months. Going into January, the troop had 4 scouts remaining on the roster after 3 of our scouts turned 18 in 2019. In March and April of this year, the troop welcomed 12 new scouts to the troop. Nine came from Pack 31 and three scouts from Pack 25 in Emmaus joined our troop. The oldest active scouts are 12 years old, making the troop very young. These scouts are determined not to let their youth slow them down. For the first time in several years, the troop now has two patrols: the Screamin' Bald Eagle Patrol and the Zionsville Zebra Patrol.

While 2020 has proven to be a challenge for everyone, the scouts of Troop 31 have persevered. When we were not able to meet, the troop held virtual troop meetings. When summer camp was canceled, they all decided that they wanted to have their own summer camp. The leadership of the troop made that happen at Camp Serranova. Many of the new scouts earned their Scout Rank, their Totin' Chip, and their Fireman Chit while at our summer camp. In addition to working on the First Aid Merit Badge and many other advancement items.

To stay in compliance with current regulations from the State of Pennsylvania and the US Center for Disease Control, along with directives sent out from the Boy Scouts of America and the Minsi Trails Council, the troop has adopted all of the safety measures that have been put into place. Masks are worn at all times during indoor meetings. While we are participating in outdoor meetings and activities, masks are required when the scouts and leaders are within six feet of one another. While camping, each scout is required to camp in their own tent and we are taking extra precautions when handling food, utensils, and cookware.

The scouts also held a planning day in August where they all came prepared with list of ideas for the troop to do over the next year. That combined list resulted in 46 different ideas. These young men discussed all of them and decided on which ones they wanted to do. As such, they now have plans to go on a number of campouts and hikes; serve the community through different service projects; and take trips to Washington, DC, Hershey Museum, and the Gettysburg Battlefields.

Christian Education Committee Annual Report for October 2019-September 2020

Fall of 2019 began another new year of Sunday School at our church. We have classes for children ages 2 through 6th grade. There were no youth interested in Confirmation this year so we did not start a confirmation class. We have 2 or 3 pre-teens who would be eligible.

Pat Sajkowicz provides music time for all combined classes. The group sings in worship at least twice a year.

We offered Third Sunday Treats to the congregation in the lower social hall every Third Sunday from 9:45-10:10 a.m. Coffee, cold drinks and treats are offered to anyone who stops by. The children especially enjoy these Sunday treats. We thank **Wanda Yeakel, Jack and Wendy Yeakel** for serving these treats and preparing the drinks, as well as cleaning up each Third Sunday.

We were off to a fine start and just getting rolling into the Spring when the Corona Virus pandemic stopped everything in its tracks. Sunday School stopped meeting on March 15 and all special programs ceased as well as any Bible Studies we were offering. As of this writing Sunday School has not yet reconvened. We are uncertain as to when we may be able to physically meet again in the building.

Starting in September, we decided to at least send worksheets to the homes of the children in Sunday School and to several other children in our church family. So weekly, our children receive their "Church Mail." We are hopeful that this at least keeps the kiddos learning and growing in the Bible Stories which match the stories that are being read and explored in worship each Sunday. Pastor Lori also emails the parents and teachers every week to alert them to the Bible Story that the children will be receiving in the mail. That way if the parents and teachers wish to keep up with what we are working on, they have that chance.

Thanks for all of the love and care our teachers and helpers have been giving our children throughout many years in our Sunday School and beyond. We are anxious to get back, but want to do so safely and with meaning as we continue to shine God's light and love in our community.

Computer and Media Committee Annual Report for October 2018 to September 2019

Committee Members: Lori Esslinger (Pastor), Mark Weaver (Chair), Beth Massa, Joan Muth, Kelly Kowalewski, Tyler Rhoads, Robert Schmeltzle, Jr., Daniel Latshaw

Committee Purpose: The faith-based purpose of the Computer and Media Committee is to foster communication both inside and outside of Old Zionsville UCC (OZUCC). The committee promotes community, ideas, and activities by helping people experience and share the loving presence of God and to understand what OZUCC stands for and who we are. All Information Technology, including software and hardware, of OZUCC is maintained at an affordable price.

Despite the COVID-19 Pandemic, we had another busy year, again taking on additional responsibility and several aggressive projects. We continued moving forward in this very important support role for the church, utilizing our two sub-committees functioning within our framework: that of Information Technology (IT) and Sound & Audio.

October 2019:

- A committee meeting of the Sound Team was held on October 28th with 5 members present
- The schedule and timing of the Christmas Eve Services was discussed
- Tyler Rhoads gave an update on training for the Sound Technicians
- There was discussion about adding at least one additional Technician to help spread the load
- The proposed budget for 2020 included the following projects:
 - Permanent installation of the Surround Sound Speakers
 - A new projector mounted at the rear of the Sanctuary
 - Installation of Auxiliary Speakers (Narthex, Kitchen, & Nursery)
 - New microphones for the Men in the Choir
 - A Sound System for the Lower Social Hall

November 2019:

- A committee meeting of the IT Team was held on November 18th with 5 members present
- Beth Massa gave an update on the Website, whereby it had suffered a bit due to her competing priorities with her extremely busy work schedule
- There was hope that the new Media Coordinator would come on board in January 2020, but the hiring of this position was delayed (see below)
- Existing IT Projects were also delayed due to Mark Weaver's busy work schedule. The following projects were still pending:
 - Building and installing the Sound System PC
 - IT Infrastructure Cabinet and Copper Network re-wiring
 - Internet Security Software installation
 - Office PC Upgrades
- The 2020 budget was approved for the following:
 - IT Capital: (New Projector funded by Outlook)
 - IT Operating: (As requested)
 - Sound Capital: (As requested with Microphones funded by Outlook)
 - Sound Operating: (As requested)
- Social Media Coordinator Position
 - The position was approved by Consistory but not by the Congregation
 - Needed a complete Job Description (Pastor Lori and Beth Massa)
 - Needed a list of Future Programs that this position would benefit (Pastor Lori)
 - Needed to find funding (???)

December 2019:

- There was no meeting again this December due to inclement weather, but work continued
- The IT Team continued their work on the Job Description for the Media Coordinator and preparing for a meeting with the Finance Committee in January 2020
- Sound System operation for the three Christmas Eve Services was covered by Alyson Miller and Dan Latshaw
- Projects simmered due to everyone's busy schedules in December

January 2020:

- A special committee meeting of the IT Team was held on January 6th with 5 members present to continue the pursuit of the Media Coordinator
- The regular meeting scheduled for January 20th was canceled due to Mark traveling on business
- The Job Description for the Media Coordinator position that was developed by Pastor Lori and Beth Massa was read and discussed.
- Pastor Lori revised the Job Description based on comments from the team
- Pastor Lori and Beth Massa presented the Job Description to the Finance Committee on January 15th with their blessing to proceed with getting approval from Consistory
- Consistory approved the Media Coordinator Job Description and position on Jan 21st, but congregational support and approval was still needed
- Pastor Lori worked on a Grant Application to PNEC that could possibly fund the Media Coordinator
- Work sessions for various projects were scheduled for February and March
- Mark Weaver began getting quotations for the new Projector
- The Team was asked to help specify, purchase, and install a Video Surveillance System (Cameras) to be paid by Property and Village School due to some recent vandalism
- 2019 spending came in under budget

February 2020:

- A committee meeting with the combined IT and Sound Teams was held on February 18th with 6 members present.
- The Sound Team began planning for the special services during Holy Week
- Beth Massa made some small modifications and corrections to the Website to keep it going until the Media Coordinator can take over
- Pastor Lori continued to work on the Grant from PNEC to offset the cost of the Media Coordinator position for the first year
- Quotes for the new Projector were presented and approved by Finance and Consistory and the order placed on February 19th.
- Quotes for the Security Camera System were presented and approved by Property and Consistory and the order placed on February 24th.
- A work detail was held on Saturday February 29 to install the IT Cabinet, Network Wiring, and Infrastructure. 3 members were present plus the help of Rich Shoemaker.

March 2020:

- And then the COVID-19 Pandemic hit sending all into isolation and curtailing most activities at the church
- The committee meeting for March was canceled due to the pandemic
- A work detail was held on Saturday March 14th to install Network, Projector, Security Camera, and Speaker wiring along with the installation of the Sound PC. 4 members were present plus the help of Rich and Brenda Shoemaker and Kathy Latshaw.
- The Grant Application to PNEC was presented and approved by Consistory
- The Projector / Lens arrived, and Rich Shoemaker began work on fabricating and installing a shelf at the back of the Sanctuary
- The Security Camera System materials also arrived this month

- Sound System materials (Amplifiers, Speakers, and Microphones) were ordered

April 2020:

- The COVID-19 pandemic continued and again, the committee meeting for April was canceled
- All services during Holy Week were canceled due to the pandemic
- The Grant Application was sent in to PNEC by the April 15th deadline
- Most of the Sound System materials arrived and the new microphones for the Bell Choir were installed
- The Head End for the Security Camera System was installed awaiting the installation of the cameras

May 2020:

- On May 18th, we held a virtual committee meeting via Webex with 5 members logging in for the sole purpose of discussion around the GEM Grant from PNEC that was awarded to us for the funding of the Media Coordinator's position
- We received the Grant of \$3000 and additional monies could be available later in the year
- With funding now in place, the position must now be approved by the Congregation
- The Projector was installed, but computer and cabling issues prevented completion of the project

June 2020:

- Once again, the pandemic prevented an in-person committee meeting in June
- The Sound Team provided equipment and operation for the Outdoor (Parking Lot) service on June 7th
- A letter was sent out to announce the receipt of the PNEC Grant, communicating the Job Description for the Media Coordinator, and preparing the Congregation for the vote of approval
- We had an extremely productive work detail on Saturday June 13th to complete the installation of additional wiring for the Projector, the Surround Sound Speakers, the Men's Choir Microphones, the Choir Monitor Speakers, and the Piano Microphone. Again, we had 3 members and the help of Rich Shoemaker.
- Another work detail was held on June 27th to install the Cameras and startup the Security System

July 2020:

- There was no committee meeting in July more due to a lack of agenda than because of the pandemic
- The Media Coordinator Job Description and Position was approved at the Special Congregational meeting by an overwhelming consent on Sunday July 19th.
- The new Projector and Sound PC have been used for the indoor / in-person services held each week
- The Surround Sound Speakers and Amplifier seem to have made a significant improvement in the sound at the rear of the Sanctuary

August 2020:

- The combined C&M Committee (IT and Sound) finally met in person on August 17th with 5 Members present.
- The focus this month was on brain-storming a budget for 2021 to include Capital and Operation of the both the IT and Sound environments. There was discussion

on installing a system with the capabilities of streaming our services to the internet.

- We began broadcasting the Media Coordinator's position within the Congregation and through PNEC which only netted 2 applications. Pastor Lori subsequently submitted the job to Indeed with hopes of receiving more interest.

September 2020:

- There was no committee meeting in September.
- Mark Weaver met with the Office Staff on September 3rd to discuss the various computer upgrades planned for the office systems later in the year
- The Sound Team again provided equipment and operation for the Outdoor (Parking Lot) service on September 6th
- The new projector continues to be used weekly in support of services without the use of Hymnals
- Indeed has provided almost 50 applications for the Media Coordinator position, which the team started to process

Looking Forward - There is still more work to be done:

- Selecting and Hiring the Media Coordinator
- Completing the installation of the Auxiliary Speakers for the Narthex, Nursery, and Kitchen
- Upgrading the Secretary and Finance PCs Operating System and support software
- Follow through on the Sound and Audio Training / Operating Manual Update
- Additional minor improvements for the Sound System
- Implementation of our 2021 Budget Line Items, if approved
- Updated IT Audit and comparison to 2017 with Committee review

Finance Committee Annual Report October 2019 to September 2020

A year ago, the Finance Committee was looking forward to "getting back to normal" following the Church's successful campaign to complete and pay for, the bell tower and building repairs. We proceeded to review and update various Church policies, and add a Records Retention Policy. Todd and Brenda worked on aligning items in the Chart of Accounts. We changed our natural gas supplier to Dominion. Several updates were made in the Church office. The Social and Aid Committee contributed toward the purchase of a new folding machine, Quickbooks was upgraded and the paper shredded was replaced. Work dates were also set up for reorganization of the office.

In April, we went virtual with our meetings. We thank Robin for facilitating remote meetings through June. We chose to rollover the Parsonage lease for another year and advised the tenants of the security camera installations. Repairs were made to the toilet and front door lock, and a new stove was installed.

In May the committee decided to apply for the Payroll Protection Program loan. In processing the paperwork, we discovered that the name of the church had never officially been changed with the State from Evangelical and Reformed to United Church of Christ. Robin and Brenda were able to get the paperwork sent through the lawyer and approved before the PPP filing deadline. Thanks to the efforts of Brenda and Chris Schell, our PPP application was approved and used to pay salaries and utilities. When we are notified by the bank, we will apply for loan forgiveness.

The Finance Committee appreciates the continued financial support from the congregation during this challenging year. We have been able to meet our budgeted expenses while new projects like the Window Fund are succeeding, as well. We researched four online giving service providers and determined this option is not feasible at this time.

Ed Reis preached during Pastor Lori's vacation at the end of February. The congregation enjoys hearing his witty and thought provoking messages. Our Ash Wednesday Service was tricky this year due to Pastor Lori's vacation and the substitute preacher being sick. Our Consistory President Kathy Latshaw rose to the challenge and had neighboring Pastor Marty Milne from the Lutheran Church bless the elements so we could move forward with worship!

It was a beautiful day and we had a great attendance outside. All other services were cancelled for the rest of June and the Dillingersville service was cancelled too. It was our turn to host. We will host in 2021 instead. The three lead Pastors for Dillingersville got together at the Lutheran Church on June 28 which would have been our Sunday, to tape and provide a live worship service on Uncle Jeffrey's WTAP. Sept 13 we went back into the sanctuary for worship at 10:15 a.m. Music and Worship Committee met and suggested that the service time remain between 30 - 45 minutes. Our Sound System team was sharing the service on Power Point using the new projector we purchased (funded by Outreach committee). Some of the services went over an hour. We heard complaints so we are trying very hard to keep the services to no more than 45 minutes. Harvest Home service on Sept. 27 was wonderful this year. We advertised for many weeks ahead that the food pantry needed certain canned items and folks were quite generous and provided more than 20 grocery bags of canned goods that enhanced the display provided by Nancy Civitts and Carolyn Rhoads. It was lovely.

Moving forward we hope and pray that restrictions will be lifted soon since many members still do not come to worship for fear of the virus. Our choirs continue to be silent but we persevere to gather for worship because fellowship is a strong element of who we are as a church family in Old Zionsville PA.

The Village School Annual Report for 2018/2019 School Year

Founded in 1980, this year marks our 40th year at the Village School, and sadly due to Covid, the final year of our preschool. Our year began like any other year, with Get Acquainted on Wednesday, September 4th. Our first day of school was Monday, September 9th for our 2's and Pre-k classes, and Tuesday, September 10th for our 3's.

In October, our 3's and Pre-k classes visited Savage Farms. Also in October, our Pre-k class visited the Emmaus Fire Company, and the Upper Milford Fire Company came to visit our 3's class at the Village School. We enjoyed Thanksgiving celebrations, Santa visits and Valentine's exchanges. The Pre-k Post Office field trip with Miss Sheila, and our 3's field trip to Rita's with Miss Carolyn were our last two field trips this year. The children were blessed to have our Resident Artists classes with Miss Lilly from Allegro Dance and Miss Brittney, our Yoga teacher. This summer, we celebrated an unprecedented Covid safe outdoor Pre-k Graduation Ceremony in the church parking lot! Thanks to Pastor Lori, Phil Rhoads, and Susan Hoch for the extra help, and to the board and teachers for all of your help.

Our 2020/2021 registration opened when the children returned from Christmas break. When our school year ended abruptly on March 12, 2020 due to the statewide shutdown, it had a negative impact on our enrollment. Covid caused us to experience the lowest enrollment in the history of Village School. Like everyone else, we waited to see where this time in our history would go. We did not receive many registrations prior to closing in March, and no new registrations came in over the shutdown. Our teachers were uncomfortable starting in September and wanted to wait to open until January. We began holding meetings both in person and via phone after graduation. Together, the staff and I tried to strategize a way to open our doors for the new school year.

We knew that our 2's class was not an option with only 3 enrollments. And if we combined our 3's and Pre-k classes together to make one class, we wouldn't have had half the students needed to make the class cost effective. We gathered parent's feedback and there was much uncertainty amongst them. Mostly, the parents who had children enrolled were anxious and uneasy about their children returning to preschool because of what could happen in the Fall with the predictions of rising cases. Unfortunately, we had parents pull out, parents not wanting to send their toddlers if their older children had to do school virtually, parents who did not want their children to wear masks, parents who wouldn't return until there was a vaccine, and some who would go to another school if we didn't open in September.

We discussed possibly closing just for this year until a vaccine was available. But realistically, knew that in that years' time, we would more than likely lose our staff to other jobs and that we would lose the few parent board members that we did have as they moved on to other preschools as well. With only one church member left on our board after I resign, and no one from the congregation able to provide leadership as the new chair, we felt that we had no choice but to close the Village School.

The decision to close the the Village School was not taken lightly. It was emotional and heartbreaking knowing that we would be closing our doors after 40 years of service to our community. If we had ran a class with only a few children in it, it would have depleted the balance of our account and set in motion a failure to thrive for the following year by not having the feeder classes necessary to build the following year.

We will close our books by the end of December 2020, and donate money in memory of Bob Benner to the church to help with expenses that are needed at this time. Bob was a wonderful soul and an incredible asset to our church and the Village

School for many years. It was Bob's love, and belief in the Village School that kept our doors open when we suffered low enrollment 4 years ago. It is with love from the Village School, that we donate money to the church in his memory.

We would like to give a heartfelt thank you to our congregation for all of their love and support over the years. It has meant more to us than you'll ever know. Thank you Linda Bertie for having the vision to start the Village School at OZUCC 40 years ago. Thank you Brenda Seitz for your help and support over the years, you were a godsend to our school. Thank you Pastor Lori for everything. Your love and support did not go unnoticed. Thank you Wendy Yeakel, for your 20+ years of service, teaching and influence to our children. The Village School would not have been what it was if it was not for you. You taught our children with love, compassion and empathy, going above and beyond to create the most incredible preschool experience for our children. Thank you Liz Hersh, for being Wendy's long standing, dependable aide and partner for years. The two of you have impacted the lives of so many children as you built a strong foundation for them grow. Thank you to each and every teacher and aide for their contribution to the Village School over the years. And thank you to every church member who volunteered on our board for the last 40 years.

As we close out our final year at Village School, we leave with the knowledge that we are the Village that built a strong foundation for the 1000+ children that walked through our doors. We have been blessed by each of you. We thank your parents for leaving you in our care and for letting us be a part of their lives. For this, we have been blessed.

Windows to the Future Annual Report for Oct. 2019-Sept. 2020

The "Windows to the Future" logo, named by Jane Bedell and created by Beth Massa, was used regularly in the bulletin and newsletter announcements. Beginning in October special Windows giving envelopes were placed in the pews to encourage regular contributions to the campaign.

The committee researched various stained glass studios and Pastor Lori networked with churches in the Penn Northeast Conference for referrals and campaign ideas. Throughout the fall and winter, five studio representatives visited from Pennsylvania, New Jersey and as far away as Minnesota. The last studio to visit (on March 6th just prior to the Covid 19 virus) was Cumberland Stained Glass in Mechanicsburg. The committee was impressed with their plan and experience and, after references were checked and with Finance Committee and Consistory approval, a contract was signed May 12. It covered restoration of the descending dove and wheat twin windows flanking the organ. Work would begin in the fall of 2020 with completion by Christmas.

Fund raising began in December with the Outlook Committee donating \$1,000 to the fund from the cookie walk and soup fundraiser. A "Matching Gift" fundraising campaign ran throughout January and February thanks to a generous member who offered to donate up to \$2,000 to the fund if the congregation could match the amount. The congregation exceeded this, donating \$3,114! In April the Social and Aid Society donated \$326 profit from the beef pie sale. During July and August, the congregation deposited loose change in the "Change for Windows" jar totaling \$134.91.

Throughout the year, and even during the Covid virus when worship was halted, members continued to generously support the project with their giving. Other donations to the fund have been received in memory of James Laudenslager, William Stahler, Bernadine Stahler and Ruth-Ann Schell.

On September 14, the restoration began with Cumberland removing the four medallions in the dove and wheat windows for handoff to their artist for reproduction. Looking forward to installation of the new windows by Christmas 2020!
