I. Gathering

Public worship is always to be introduced with a verse (or a few verses) of a suitable hymn; after the singing of which the minister steps before the altar, and addresses the congregation as follows:

Dearly beloved,

Thus says the high and holy one, that inhabits eternity, whose name is Holy: "I dwell in the high and holy place, with them also that is of a contrite and holy spirit; to revive the spirit of the humble, and the heart of the contrite ones. For I will not contend forever, nor will I be always angry; therefore, acknowledge your misdoings and confess your sins before the Lord your God."

For he has promised that if we confess our sins, he is faithful and just to forgive our sins and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness.

All ye then that are present, confess with me your sins in the following manner:

I your poor sinner acknowledge before God my heavenly father, that I have sadly, deeply, and in a manifold manner sinned against you; not only with outward sins, but more abundantly so with inward blindness, unbelief, doubts, despair, impatience, pride, sinful self-love, evil desires, covetousness, private envy, hatred and ill-will, together with many other evil deeds, which are all well-known to God, and which alas I myself cannot perfectly know. And now, O Lord, these things grieve, and cause me sorrow, and I desire fervently to receive forgiveness and grace through your well-beloved Son Jesus Christ; making now a fresh dedication of myself to you, with a sincere promise through the assistance of your holy spirit to live more holy and obedient unto you. Amen.

Lord God our heavenly Father have mercy upon us. Lord Jesus Christ, the Savior of the world have mercy upon us. God the Holy Ghost have mercy upon us, and grant us your peace. Amen.

II. Word

The minister further addresses the congregation as follows: The Lord be with you. And with your spirit.

Here the minister prays again a suitable prayer [such as the Prayer of the Day]. [Collect for 2nd Sunday after Trinity: "O Lord, who never fails to help and govern those whom you bring up in your steadfast fear and love: Make us to have a perpetual fear and love of your holy Name; through your Son, Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Ghost, one God, world without end. **Amen**.]

Scripture Reading


Epistle: 1 John 3:13-18

D o not be astonished, brothers and sisters, that the world hates you. ¹⁴ We know that we have passed from death to life because we love the brothers and sisters. Whoever does not love abides in death. ¹⁵ All who hate a brother or sister are murderers, and you know that murderers do not have eternal life abiding in them. ¹⁶ We know love by this, that he laid down his life for us—and we ought to lay down our lives for the brothers and sisters. ¹⁷ How does God's love abide in anyone who has the world's goods and sees a brother or sister in need and yet refuses help? ¹⁸ Little children, let us love not in word or speech but in deed and truth.

Gospel: Luke 14:15-24

The Parable of the Great Dinner

O ne of the dinner guests, on hearing this, said to him, "Blessed is anyone who will eat bread in the kingdom of God!" ¹⁶ Then Jesus said to him, "Someone gave a great dinner and invited many. ¹⁷ At the time for the dinner he sent his slave to say to those who had been invited, 'Come, for everything is ready now.' ¹⁸ But they all alike began to make excuses. The first said to him, 'I have bought a piece of land, and I must go out and see it; please accept my regrets.' ¹⁹ Another said, 'I have bought five yoke of oxen, and I am going to try them out; please accept my regrets.' ²⁰ Another said, 'I have just been married, and therefore I cannot come.'²¹ So the slave returned and reported this to his master. Then the owner of the house became angry and said to his slave, 'Go out at once into the streets and lanes of the town and bring in the poor, the crippled, the blind, and the lame.' ²² And the slave said, 'Sir, what you ordered has been done, and there is still room.' ²³ Then the master said to the slave, 'Go out into the roads and lanes, and compel people to come in, so that my house may be filled. ²⁴ For I tell you, none of those who were invited will taste my dinner.' "]

III. Prayers

The Universal Church-Prayer

Most merciful and gracious Father in Christ, who has promised to hear the prayers of the poor and not to turn your ears away from their cry! We come united before your face, the whole congregation for this purpose has assembled itself together; but you have commanded us to pray not only for ourselves, but for all humankind; yes you have graciously promised to hear our weak prayers, and to fulfill our humble petitions; we obey your command, and in deep humility represent your promise before you; show yourself as the father of humankind, whom your Son dearly purchased with his own blood; remember those who are enveloped in darkness, and those upon which the light of your gospel has not yet shined; break the bands of satan, and let the light of your knowledge prevail over all the earth.

Remember your Church; help that therein may be found both name and power. Destroy the power of bigotry and superstition, and work a deliverance against the power of unbelief. Let your evangelical Church be particularly favored, and grant, that all who belong to it may experience the power of her evangelical doctrines in their hearts.

And as we have the commandment in your word, to pray for all those that rule and are in power in the world, so we recommend to your favor all who govern, grant them all true qualities of leadership, that your fear may be before their eyes and in their hearts. Praised be you that you have broken the chains, that others thought to bind us; praised be you for the freedom which your powerful arm has obtained for us; praise be to you for the freedom which we now enjoy; but protect us for Christ's sake, that this may not lead us to unreasonable contempt of danger. Keep your eyes constantly over this your people, whom you have chosen as your heirs; to this end, fill those who govern this land with the spirit of wisdom and the fear of the Lord. Grant that peace and union may through their endeavors be extended over and continued in the land, and that the honor of your name, and the prosperity of the kingdom of your Son, may be the uttermost care

of their hearts. Help that these United States may constantly continue in the bonds of peace and love, that their bond may be a bond which shall continue until the end of days. Remember, O Father in particular the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, crown our leaders with wisdom and the love of righteousness. Fill our lawgivers with your spirit, that all the laws which are, or shall be made may tend to the happiness of the citizens of this commonwealth. Help that right and justice may be observed by our judges without particularity or respect to persons. Cleanse the land from vice, and let much fruit of true Godliness be perceived in the land. Help that wickedness may hide its face from Godliness, and that it may have no reason to fear on account of vice.

In particular be gracious to our congregation[s], that peace and brotherly love may be kept in the same. Bless the officers of the church, bless parents and children, and especially bless our schools.

Bless the cultivation of land, bless all business that are pleasing to you both by sea and by land.

Receive under your gracious protection all that are pregnant and nursing, all widows and orphans. Help every individual in their need, and be gracious to all in any place who cry to you, keep us in your love, and let everything work for our good. Turn away from us in mercy all richly deserved land troubles, war, hunger, and fearcity; fire and water perils; pestilence and other evils on humankind and cattle, and everything else which our sins have richly deserved.

Grant us pleasant weather and let the fruits of the earth prosper abundantly. Be a savior of all people, especially those that believe. You holy God protect us from sin and shame, and assist us with your good spirit, that we may not forfeit your blessing by our transgressions, nor draw down your righteous judgements on us. We acknowledge O Lord that when you deal according to your longsuffering toward us, that it was not our righteousness that draws you unto it (for we are unprofitable servants before you) but it is purely on account of your own free and undeserved mercy, according to which be still gracious unto us, and draw our hearts in love toward our neighbors, to sorrow with all who are in distress, that we may never forget to do good to everyone, even to our foes, that we may thereby manifest ourselves to be children of God. Protect us from sudden death, and prepare us more and more, through your spirit and grace for a happy end. To this end teach us to seek no desire but your love, no profit but the gifts and graces of your holy Spirit, no honor but that we should be your children and made one with you, no adornment but the righteousness of Jesus Christ, no life and support but your grace and union. Especially in the last hour of death keep satan with all his temptations from us, and increase our faith in your Son Jesus Christ, that thereby we may overcome all the fears and terrors of death. When our ears can no longer hear, let your holy Spirit bear.

When also our tongues can speak no more then let your spirit make intercession for us before you with unutterable groanings, and teach us to call upon you Abba! Dear Father! In your hand I commit my spirit. Grant also most faithful God, that we may live in your fear, die in your grace, depart in your peace, rest in the grave under your protection, be raised again through your power, and then heir the glorious hope of eternal life, through Jesus Christ, your dearly beloved Son, our Lord, to whom with you and the Holy-Ghost, be ascribed all honor praise and glory now and forevermore. **Amen.**
